Room Christian Practice in the Classroom

Several faculty members will share how they have implemented a variety of Christian Practices into their courses and the impact this has had on their students.

Room Making and Sustaining Inclusive Change in the Classroom

Dr. Dustin Thoman, professor of social psychology at SDSU, consults with universities across the U.S., helping them improve learning for all students as they become more inclusive. He will walk us through his "Change Model" that begins by learning about and empathizing with the problems and barriers students encounter in our classes. You'll learn about a student-focused approach to improving classroom practices using an iterative design model for implementing small changes, measuring the outcomes of those changes, and learning from feedback. You will also hear from PLNU faculty members who participated last year in a Faculty Learning Community where they planned and implemented changes in their classes using the Change Model. They will share their experience with this process and the outcomes of their improvement efforts.

Room Universal Design for Learning: Removing the Barriers to Learning


